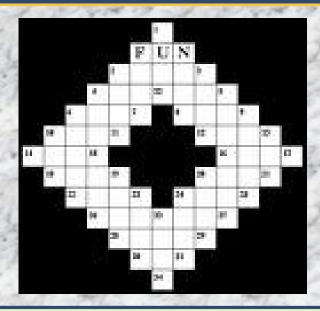

SINHALA LESSON

Reading and Writing Sinhala for the Three to Six Year Olds

This is the first article of a series under the title "Reading and Writing Sinhala for the three to six year olds." First I would like to write about language learning of a young child.

Language Learning:

Learning of any language is the child's most remarkable and amazing achievement and one of the first intellectual tasks of the child. Young children achieve the language skill so rapidly in a very short time. They learn and absorb like a sponge. From the day they were born, they watch the lips move, by six months start repeating the syllables, by nine months they know that words have meanings, by twelve months they intentionally repeat the words, by fifteen months their objects have names, by eighteen months baby talk begins, by twenty-four months they talk in sentences. The parents are the child's first language teachers. Human voice is so important in the intellectual development of the young. The first six years of the child's life, is the most important period with a special sensitivity to language.

According to Dr. Maria Montessori, "Not only he creates his language, but he shapes the organs that enable him to frame the words." Among thousands of sounds and noises that the baby hears, s/he reproduces only those of the human voice. The sounds at first that were meaningless, bring him/her comprehension and ideas. The child has absorbed sentences and their constructions. As Dr. Montessori puts it, "We acquire knowledge by using our minds, but the child absorbs knowledge directly into his psychic life... The child creates his own 'mental muscles.' We name this type of mentality, 'The absorbent mind.'" S/he learns his/her mother tongue, unaware of the complexity of its grammar or its difficulties in pronunciation.

During this sensitive period, a second language can be introduced to the child. S/he should hear clear speech, good pronunciation and correct grammar. As bilingual parents, ideal way is to use both languages in the home. Also the child can learn another language from neighbors, relatives or even from a tutor.

Other sources: Libraries have good book and non-book materials for language learning for children. Educational television stations offer language lessons.

The sensitive period for language is the time of golden opportunity for the child to learn with ease. Languages can still be learned after this sensitive period. But it will take a conscientious effort to acquire the language, which comes naturally to the small child.

ONION RICE

1. 2 cups Basmati rice cooked (or any other type of white

rice)

- 2. 1 large onion chopped finely
- 3. 2 large cloves of garlic
- 4. 3 green chilies chopped
- 5. 1 sprig curry leaves chopped
- 6. 3 tablespoons oil

Heat the oil in a pan. When heated add the onions, garlic, chilies and curry leaves to it. Fry well until the onions are golden brown and a soft aroma is produced. Stir well, add the cooked rice to it and continue to mix well. If more oil is required add some more to it. Add some salt and pepper according to taste to the rice and mix well. Serve hot and enjoy. Is excellent served with chili paste and fried eggs but can be enjoyed on its own as well.

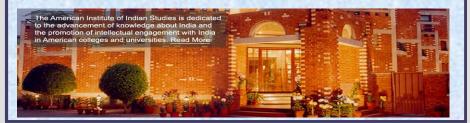

Memories from my first year at Mahamaya

I started schooling in Mahamaya Girls' College in 1982. The year was special because the school celebrated her 50th birthday. I was in the sixth grade class. 6-B, to be specific. Our class was in the oldest building that existed. Together with our class, there were two other sixth grade classes. 6 D class was in the new building close by. The building we were in was really old and "to my feeling" it was ready to collapse at any time. I am not sure how many times I looked at the roof. Even though it was old- it housed a music room, art room, agriculture room, home science room and many study rooms together with a "bathroom complex". We were all new to each other so everyone made friends fast. Our class teacher was Mrs.L.Gunasekara. We had 46 students in our class which included Ramya, Indrani, Dhammika, Mallika, Susantha, Anusha, Samudrika, Dulini, Dilrukshi, Champa, Chandana, Himashini, Awanthi, Anoma, Gayana, Nishani, shirani, Priyani, Deepika, Saroja, Chamila, Upeksha, Indumathi, Priyanvada, Gowry, Priyanka, Kusalika, Ajitha, Ayoma and the rest I can't recall. When something was done according to the register's order I was easily spotted because I was 6B -2, the second in the register of attendance.

During that time Samuduni Wijayatilaka was the head prefect. She was nice and kind to us. We mostly saw the other older akkas on Mondays when we had assembly in the playground. The other four days assembly was taken over by Mrs.Karunaratna for 6th and 7th grades just outside our class rooms.

Mrs. Gunasekara, Mrs. Kumari Herath, Mrs. N.Weerasinghe, Mrs. Ranpatabendi, Mrs. I. Petiyagoda, Mrs. Navaratne, Mrs. M Silva were the first set of teachers who brightened my first year. I did eastern music and agriculture as specials. As I remember some of my other friends had Mrs. Rajapakse, Mrs. Niyangoda and Mrs.Seneviratna for their specials (Dancing, Art and home science).

We did "Diya –goda" in the flight of steps which shaped like a moon stone. We picked "Thel –Endaru" seeds every morning and I can't remember what we did with them. I'm sure no one ate them because everyone is still alive!

My first day after school was not at all fun. Since I was not riding an assigned school bus, I had to squeeze in to one of those buses which passed via Kandy town. So I just took Kadugannawa school bus –the first one I saw after coming out the gate by the girls' hostel. It was not a fun ride. I felt as if my rib cage was being crushed .It was hard to breath. I was surrounded by the big girls and their loud voices. I cried but did not forget to keep my head up to reach the open air above. When the bus stopped at central Market, the battle began! I was out, but my back pack and the water bottle were still struggling to make their way out. Finally I was the proud owner of a bag with a broken strap and a bottle with no cap!

Do you think being a sixth grader was so much fun? Well, we were under some pressure outside the class. We always thought why the fifth graders had to come and invade some of those vacant rooms in that building. So we were ruled by "nangi s" and "akka s" alike. We were empowered by those already ruling 'seniors' in primary section. Shhh! There were some nangi s who really ruled us .If we did not listen we were in trouble. They knew the school surroundings better than we did. That's the reason. So we had to obey. But at the end of the day we were happy no matter what happened during the day.

I still remember Gayana and Anusha's antics in the class. Himashinie, Chandana Kumari and Champa were the whispering trio. Gowri was even quieter. They were talking. But not like on top of the voices like some of us !My loud voice was not welcomed by Mrs Gunasekara .She has carefully put it this way to my mom's ear at the parents' day "She is doing very well in class But she'll do much better if she lowers the volume of her voice.." I love my teacher! But my voice remained the same.

There're so many untold stories and sweet memories in sixth grade. Soon the building was brought down to make way to the auditorium .During my very few visits, I would go there and I walk around. I could still feel the atmosphere. I recall the beautiful memories linked to the yester years. It's been a long time. It's been 28 years! Yet the memories of the happy days will stay forever in my heart.
